

Hello All! I hope the school year and winter has been good for you so far. We're in the midst of the state legislative session and there are a lot of exciting bills still in the House and Senate. If they pass, they will benefit our Native students and support tribal educational sovereignty.

Contact your state legislators and make your voice heard. You can find out who represents you and their contact information by going to https://app.leg.wa.gov/districtfinder/ or searching "Washington find your legislator" on the web.

SSB 6262: Requiring all school districts implement Since Time Immemorial Curriculum (STI) by Sept. 1st 2022, requiring OSPI monitor implementation progress, and requiring educator training programs/schools to provide STI training to aspiring principal and administrator students.

SSB 6264: Creating a training on tribal consultation and requiring all school board members to complete training.

EHB 2551: Permitting Native students to wear traditional tribal regalia and objects of cultural significance at graduation ceremonies and related events.


