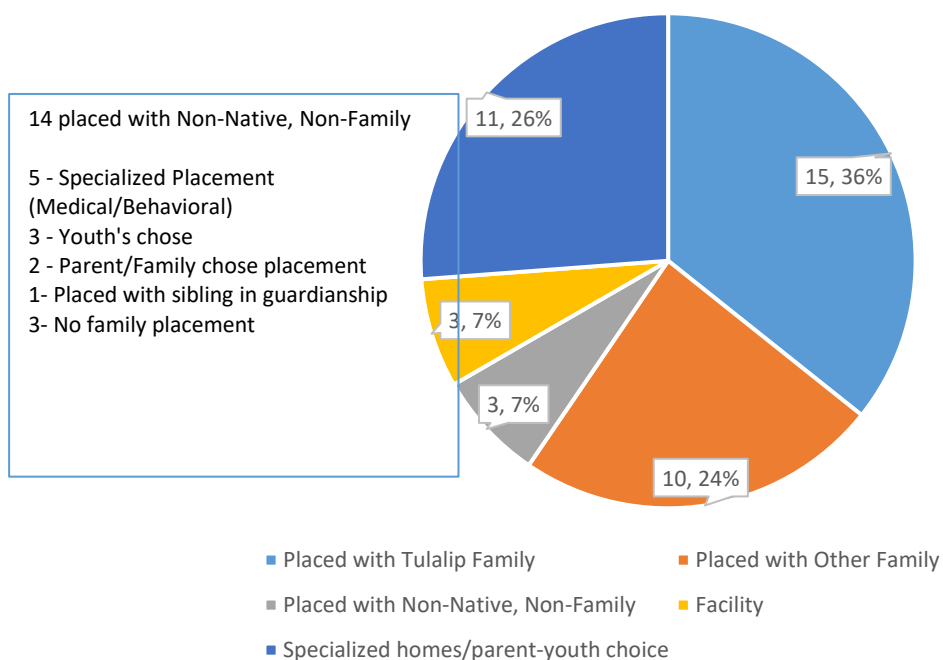

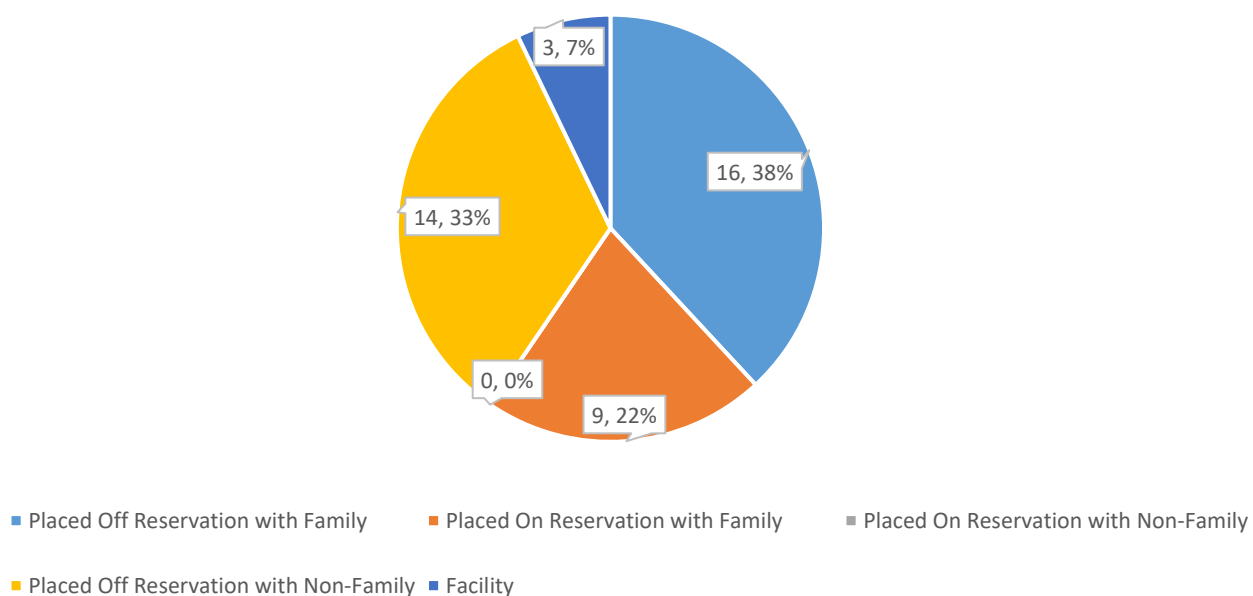
TOTAL CASE LOAD

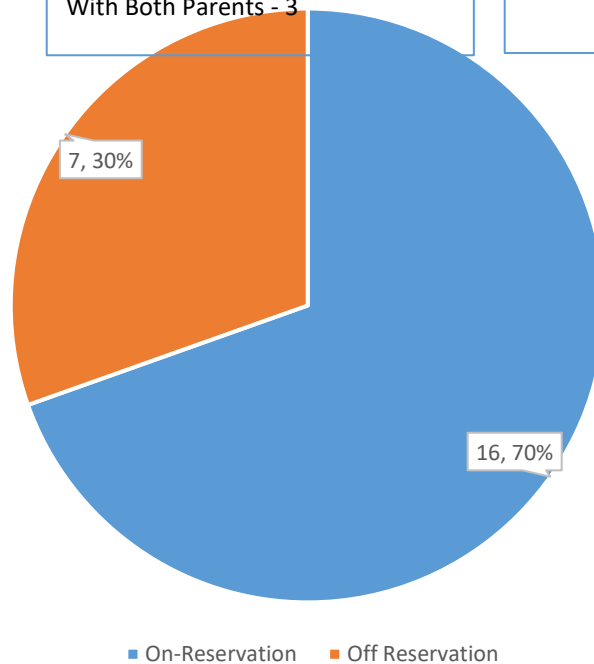


IN-HOME DEPENDENCIES

In-home dependencies occur when the parent/s have made sufficient progress in compliance with court ordered services that immediate risk and safety concerns have been alleviated allowing the child to be placed in the home with the parent/s

With Both Parents - 3

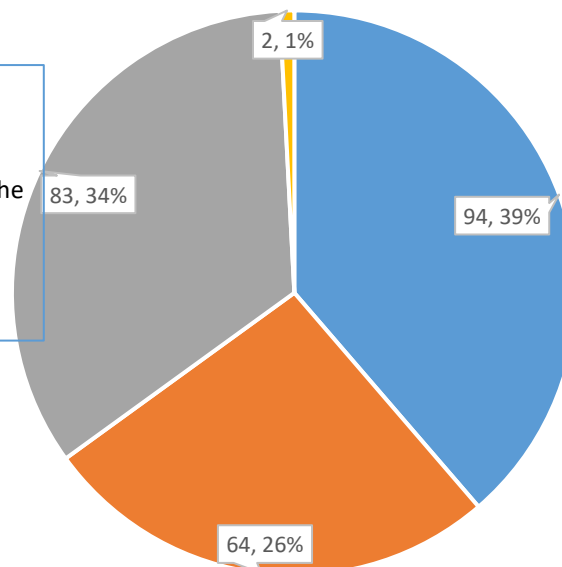
New in-home dependencies- 1

Recap/Highlights:

- There were 0 new dependencies filed
- There were 2 reunifications
- There was 1 new in-home dependency
- CWS is working with 42 total families (excluding EFC)
- There was no new guardianship established
- 4 guardianships were closed due to children aging out
- There are 162 families that have Tulalip children in Guardianship
- CPS Referred 2 families to voluntarily work with the Family Intervention Team (FIT)
- 2 families agreed to voluntarily work with FIT
- beda?chelh was granted intervener status for an out of state case
- Monthly Parent celebration and Culture night were held in March, we thank our families that attended and our staff for setting up the events
- Staff and Office of Reservation of Attorney continue to work on the final redline draft for code amendments. Our goal is to have it ready for community meeting in July 2025
- Staff and Office of Reservation Attorney are also working on updating the Intergovernmental Agreement and Foster Care Licensing standards, our goal is to license our first home by June 2025
- Imagine a new child welfare system. Tulalip Tribes is a sovereign nation, we don't have to use the state model for child welfare. We will bring together a team of volunteers to develop an action plan to change our Tribal welfare system. Begin to imagine a new way.
